Consent to treatment

When you are age 18 or older and you come for a doctor's visit, you will be asked to consent to treatment by the doctor. There is usually a form you will be asked to sign.



Remember these rules: When you sign your name, it means you agree with what is written on the page.

- Don't sign your name if you don't understand the form.
- You have the right to ask someone to explain it to you.
- You also can ask someone you trust to help you decide if you should sign it.

A consent to treatment form usually has 4 different parts:

- 1. Do you agree to have the doctor talk to you, exam you and give you advice?
- 2. Do you understand that the doctor's team promises to keep your info private?
- 3. Do you agree to let your insurance pay for the visit?
- 4. If your insurance won't pay, do you know you will be asked to pay yourself?

If you answer yes to each question, then you can sign the form.

Consent for a special test or procedure should explain:

- why you are having the test,
- what will happen during the test,
- what choices you have besides saying yes to the test,
- what problems might happen during the test, and
- what problems might happen if you do not have the test.



Make sure you understand the answers to your questions before you sign.
